

**FOURTH AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT
FOR PREVENTION SERVICES
LUTHERAN COMMUNITY SERVICES NORTHWEST**

THIS FOURTH AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT (“Amendment #4”) is made effective January 1, 2019 between Yamhill County, a political subdivision of the State of Oregon acting by and through its Board of Commissioners and its Health and Human Services Department, Behavioral Health Programs (“County”) and Lutheran Community Services Northwest (“Contractor”), an Oregon nonprofit corporation, 605 SE Cesar E. Chavez Boulevard, Portland, Oregon 97214, Tax Identification Number 93-0386860.

RECITALS:

A. County and Contractor are parties to that certain agreement dated as of January 7, 2015 (the “Underlying Agreement”), pursuant to which Contractor provides prevention services. The Underlying Agreement is memorialized in Yamhill County records as Board Order 14-738. The Underlying Agreement was first amended on December 21, 2015, memorialized as Board Order 15-530 (“Amendment #1”). The Underlying Agreement was further amended on December 21, 2016, memorialized as Board Order 16-517 (“Amendment #2”) and on December 28, 2018, memorialized as Board Order 17-506 (“Amendment #3”).

B. County and Contractor now desire to further amend the Underlying Agreement upon the terms and conditions as more particularly set forth herein below.

C. Capitalized terms not defined herein shall have the meanings attributed to such terms in the Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements set forth herein below and of other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged by the parties hereto, County and Contractor, intending legally to be bound, hereby agree as follows:

1. Section 1 “Effective Date” of the Underlying Agreement as last amended by Amendment #3 is hereby amended to extend the term of the agreement through December 31, 2019.

2. Section 2 “Contractor’s Services” of the Underlying Agreement is hereby amended to include the Scope of Services as detailed in the Proposal for January 1, 2019-December 31, 2019 which is attached hereto as Exhibit A and which is incorporated herein by this reference.

3. The balance of Section 2 of the Underlying Agreement as last amended by Amendment #3 remains unchanged.

4. Section 6 "Payment of the Contract" of the Underlying Agreement as last amended by Amendment #3 is hereby amended to include the following:

"A. **Compensation for Services.** Effective January 1, 2019 through December 31, 2019, Contractor shall receive a payment of \$5,883.17 per month. The maximum amount payable under this Agreement for the period of January 1, 2019 through December 31, 2019 is \$70,598. The maximum amount payable for performance of Services under this Agreement is now \$537,774."

5. The remainder of Section 6 of the Underlying Agreement as last amended by Amendment #3 remains unchanged.

6. Section 18 "Non-discrimination" of the Underlying Agreement is hereby deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following: "Contractor agrees that no person shall, on the grounds of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, marital status, age, or other category protected by Oregon or federal law suffer discrimination in the performance of this Agreement when employed by Contractor."

7. The balance of the Underlying Agreement remains unchanged.

8. Ratification. Except as otherwise expressly modified by the terms of this Amendment #4, the Underlying Agreement shall remain unchanged and continue in full force and effect. All terms, covenants and conditions of the Underlying Agreement not expressly modified herein are hereby confirmed and ratified and remain in full force and effect, and, as further amended hereby, constitute valid and binding obligations of Contractor enforceable according to the terms thereof.

9. Authority. County and Contractor and each of the persons executing this Amendment #4 on behalf of County and Contractor hereby covenants and warrants that: (i) such party has full right and authority to enter into this Amendment #4 and has taken all action required to authorize such party (and each person executing this Amendment #4 on behalf of such party) to enter into this Amendment #4, and (ii) the person signing on behalf of such party is authorized to do so on behalf of such entity.

10. Binding Effect. All of the covenants contained in this Amendment #4 shall be binding upon and shall inure to the benefit of the parties hereto and their respective heirs, legal representatives and permitted successors and assigns.

11. Counterparts. This Amendment #4 may be executed in multiple counterparts, each of which shall be an original, but all of which shall constitute one and the same Amendment #4.

12. Recitals. The foregoing recitals are intended to be a material part of this Amendment #4 and are incorporated herein by this reference.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the parties hereto have executed, or caused to be executed on the date indicated by their duly authorized officials, this Amendment #4 in duplicate, each of which shall be deemed an original on the date executed by all parties.



A Family Place Expansion
Child Abuse/ACE's Prevention Program
 Proposed for January 1, 2019-December 31, 2019

Overview

This targeted adverse childhood experience prevention program will bring family supports that are proven to reduce child abuse to the community's most at risk families. This targeted early intervention builds resilience in children and families and prevent the chronic conditions and corresponding costs that can develop in children and adults who have suffered from adverse childhood experiences.

Model

A Family Place expansion project will target Yamhill County's highest risk families of children from birth to age 5 with professional home visiting, parent education and therapeutic preschool. Families referred to A Family Place will be screened using the risk factor check-list ensuring that only children and families most at-risk for child abuse and neglect will receive services. The relief nursery model brings with it 30 years of data which supports the models ability to reduce child abuse risk factors, improve family stability and increase parent's ability to successfully parent their children for participating families.

Children and families will also be screened for additional family needs including being linked to a primary care doctor, mental health and chemical dependency supports and services. These YCCO families will be connected to other YCCO health services within Lutheran Community Services and in the YCCO network.

Request

The expansion project will increase our ability to serve children and families in our therapeutic classroom by sustaining 9 slots allowing us to serve *12 children a year in the therapeutic classroom program. Children in this program will receive 8 hours of therapeutic classroom time each week, transportation to and from the nursery and 4 meals. This would equate to approximately 3000 hours of therapeutic classroom time a year for at-risk children. Additionally at least one parent connected with the *12 children will be served. They will receive 2 to 4 hours of home visitation and crisis services each month or 350 hours of home visitation for vulnerable parents. Services will be reported using flexible service categories and be provided exclusively to children covered by Yamhill CCO.

*9 slots will serve an average of 12 children a year with a 22% attrition rate.

Outcomes

Families participating in relief nursery programming show statistically significant and meaningful improvements across a variety of areas, including:

- Increased parent employment (Increase of 40% over 6 months)
- Improved quality of parent-child interactions (17% over 2 years)
- Reduced use of emergency room (15% over 12 months) services and increase immunizations (6% over 12 months)
- Increased frequency of reading to children (63% increase)
- Reduced number of family child abuse and neglect risk factors (from 9 risk factors to 7 after 12 months)
- Improved family functioning and stability (54% after 24 months)

These results provide evidence of the effectiveness of Relief Nursery services in stabilizing families, improving parenting, and helping to set the stage for long-term success for children*.

The Relief Nursery Solution
