
The Yamhill County Voters' Pamphlet is published to provide a forum for candidates and the important issues being presented to you, the voters. Ballot Titles and Explanatory Statements are prepared by the jurisdiction submitting the issue to the voters. Candidate statements and measure arguments are included in the pamphlet by the payment of a fee. Not all candidates choose to submit candidate statements and appear in the voters' pamphlet. The text of each statement or argument is printed exactly as submitted, and no corrections to text are made by Yamhill County for punctuation, grammar, syntax errors or inaccurate information. The persons submitting the statements and arguments to the voters' pamphlet are solely responsible for the content. Candidates appear in the pamphlet in the same order as the names are arranged on the ballot for each race. The name order is determined by the selection of a random alphabet by the Secretary of State for each election.

As a convenience to the voters, "Official Ballot Drop Sites" have been designated in each city in the county. Look for the list of drop sites in this pamphlet. You may take your ballot to any drop site listed or an "Official Ballot Drop Site" in any other county. Please note the three drive-by drop sites, one in Newberg, one in McMinnville and one in Sheridan. These sites allow the voter to deposit a ballot without leaving the car or searching for a parking place. **Ballots deposited in official drop sites are postage free. If mailed, the postage required to return the ballot is 60¢.** Please remember, **postmarks do not count; the ballot must be in a drop site or the office of the county clerk by 8:00 p.m. election day.**

Any voter who needs assistance in voting because of any disability is invited to contact me or my staff. We will make every attempt to meet your voting needs.

We hope that you will take time to use this information and become informed on the candidates and issues. Please exercise your constitutional right to vote and select the leaders and issues for your community and country!

VOTING INSTRUCTIONS

When you get your ballot packet in the mail, immediately examine it to make certain it is complete. It should contain the following items:

- * A printed ballot on which you may vote your choices;
- * A secrecy envelope with voting instructions printed on it;
- * A pre-addressed return envelope in which to return your ballot;
- * An insert containing the full text of the state measures and drop site information.

If any items are missing or if you spoil your ballot, contact the Yamhill County Clerk's Office, 503-434-7518, and a replacement ballot pack will be sent to you.

Follow the voting instructions on the secrecy envelope.

After voting, fold your ballot along the pre-scored folds and insert it into the secrecy envelope.

Seal the return envelope and sign the statement on the back of the envelope. Your ballot will not be counted if your envelope is not signed.

Take the ballot return envelope to any "Official Ballot Drop Site" listed in this Yamhill County Voters' Pamphlet (postage free) - OR...

Place the appropriate **first class postage of 60¢** on the return envelope and mail it so that it is received in the Yamhill County Clerk's Office not later than 8:00 p.m., November 2, 2004.

If you make an error on your ballot, spoil it in any way or lose it, you may obtain a replacement ballot by contacting the Yamhill County Clerk's Office at 503-434-7518.

IMPORTANT:

YOUR BALLOT MUST BE RECEIVED BY 8:00 PM ELECTION DAY, NOVEMBER 2, OR IT WILL NOT BE COUNTED.

Office hours on November 2, 2004, are 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

All Dropsites are open until 8:00 P.M. election day.


Voting Your Ballot

To vote for a candidate whose name is printed on the ballot, with a #2 pencil or a black ball point pen, simply connect the arrow next to the candidate of your choice.

Then complete the arrow pointing to the write-in line. **You must connect the arrow to insure that your write-in vote is tallied.**

Example of how to vote for a candidate



**GASTON RURAL FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT

**EXPLANATORY STATEMENT
MEASURE 34-86**



This ballot measure asks the voters of Gaston Rural Fire District in Washington and Yamhill counties to approve a five year local option tax levy. If passed, this measure will increase taxes \$.42 per \$1,000 of assessed value. For a homeowner with an assessed value of \$150,000 the annual property tax increase will be \$63. The District's permanent rate is \$1.0921 per \$1,000 of assessed value. This rate is not adequate to cover the rising operations costs and allow the District to set aside funds for capital improvements and purchases.

The average age of the District's apparatus is 12 years. Two need replacing. In the past apparatus has been purchased out of the operating budget with the help of a flex lease. The rising costs of personnel, training and necessary equipment makes it difficult to continue funding apparatus purchases this way. The current fire station was built in 1987 and has not had any improvements made to it. It will need a new roof soon. This measure will allow for these purchases and improvement.

**EXPLANATORY STATEMENT
MEASURE 36-62**

**SHERIDAN FIRE DISTRICT GENERAL
OBLIGATION BOND AUTHORIZATION**

QUESTION: Shall the District issue general obligation bonds in an amount not exceeding \$1,035,000? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY: If approved, this measure provides funds to the District to finance the costs of:

- Acquiring public safety / fire vehicles and related apparatus; and
- Paying bond issuance costs.

The bonds will mature over 10 years or less from date of issuance and may be issued in one or more series. The estimated cost of this bond is \$0.55 per \$1000 of assessed value. The owner of a home assessed at \$100,000 is estimated to pay \$55.00 a year. The bonds shall not exceed \$1,035,000.

Why is the fire district placing a bond measure on the November Ballot? We need to replace the 4 fire engines currently being used. The oldest of these engines is a 1965 Ford that has served the district well.

Our fleet of fire engines are getting old and are not as reliable as needed for effective protection of our citizens and their property. The district has, on occasions had equipment and trucks out of service due to mechanical breakdown and unavailability of parts.

In addition, the current engines carry a combined total of 4,000 gallons of water and the new engines will carry a combined total of 8,500 gallons of water. There are times when we do not have the necessary personnel to get the engines and water tender to fires. Having greater water capacity on the trucks would allow the volunteers greater opportunity to do their jobs by having water on scene when they need it. Of course, when personnel are available the water tender will also respond increasing the effectiveness even further.

The District Plans to sell the outdated engines and place the money received for them in the vehicle retirement fund to help off set future replacement costs.

In 1983, the Sheridan Fire District requested a bond measure for the purpose of building fire stations in Sheridan and Buell. That request was granted by the voters. Since that time, the Sheridan Fire District has not asked the voters for additional funding for its operation. The Fire District has done an excellent job in working within their annually approved budget. However, due to the economy and ever increasing costs of maintenance, fuel and manpower, the department has not been able to set aside sufficient funds to replace aging necessary fire equipment.


The volunteers, Board of Directors and the staff of the Sheridan Fire District are in favor of this bond to replace the current fire engines.

What is this going to cost? The bond measure will be for \$1,035,000.00, which will mean that the tax payer will see a tax rate of about 55 cents per thousand of assessed value on their home. A home with a value of \$100,000.00 would see a cost of \$55.00 per year for 10 years to pay for this equipment and ensure there will be plenty of water carried to fight the fire and the trucks will be capable to respond in times of emergency.

**EXPLANATORY STATEMENT
MEASURE 34-81**

WHY—The Hillsboro School District Board proposes a four-year local option levy to restore some staff positions to reduce class size and to reinstate programs. If approved, the levy would raise between \$6.8 million and \$8.7 million per year for four years, for an estimated total of \$31,340,600 based on information from Washington County.

While the Hillsboro School District has funds to provide a full calendar year for 2004-2005, previous reductions resulted in increased class size and loss or reduction of student education programs. Because 74 percent of Oregon's general fund comes from personal income taxes, Oregon revenue for public services has fluctuated in the downturn of Oregon's economy. Because most funding for school budgets comes from the state's general fund, schools are affected by changes in the economy. Cautious budgeting has allowed the District to reduce the student to teacher ratio by two for 2004-05. While a local option levy would not solve all revenue shortfalls, it would contribute to slightly improved staffing and programs for students.

WHAT—The Oregon Legislature provided local communities a funding option that allows voters to make some funding decisions for their schools. The local option is a taxing formula based on Oregon's two property tax limitation laws. It is calculated differently from other school taxes and bonds.

The additional revenue from the local option would be used for additional teachers to reduce class size and to restore a portion of programs lost to budget reductions. If Measure 34-81 passes, revenue will help the District

- Reduce class size
- Increase instructional support
- Increase student safety and security personnel
- Increase operations personnel and facility maintenance
- Increase support for extracurricular programs

WHEN—The local option tax measure will appear on the November 2, 2004, ballot. This is a vote-by-mail election, and ballots will be mailed to all registered voters in mid-October.

To be eligible to vote, you must be registered by October 12, 2004. Completed ballots must reach the county elections office by 8:00 p.m. on November 2, 2004. Ballots postmarked November 2 will not count.

HOW MUCH—The proposed local option tax measure would cost the property taxpayer an increase of up to \$1.50 per \$1,000 of assessed value per year over four years. For example, for a home assessed at \$200,000 and a market value of \$250,000 the estimated yearly increase in property taxes would be approximately \$200. The property taxes would vary from property to property. Simple multiplication of the tax rate with your property value will not give an accurate estimate of your additional tax. 

Dayton has population growth pressures-increased traffic, domestic disturbances, vandalism, burglaries, and car break-ins. Citizens come to the City Council with complaints about alleged drug houses in their neighborhoods. The City's current population is 2230 - a 25% increase since the voters approved the last law enforcement tax levy in 1996. That local option tax expired on June 30, 2000. The City used reserves to pay for police services for one more year. Those funds are no longer available. The City has had no specific law enforcement services since June 30, 2001.

Water system improvements are now complete. They will allow more growth to the City over the next few years. This growth can occur on lands within the City's Urban Growth Boundary. These lands are currently zoned primarily for residential development. Such development will put more pressure on police services, and other City resources.

From 1996 to 2001, Dayton contracted with the Yamhill County Sheriff for police services. The expired local option tax, and City reserves funded about 72 hours per week of dedicated law enforcement services. It also paid for Municipal Court, 9-1-1 dispatch services, and support services.

The current measure would provide about 60 hours a week of dedicated police service. It would also pay for Municipal Court, 9-1-1 dispatch services and other support services. This levy does not include funding for a code enforcement officer.

The Yamhill County Sheriff's Office currently provides services to the City as a part of its rural patrol. Rural deputies typically handle calls in an estimated 350 square mile area. Calls are answered based upon priorities set by the department. If this levy passes, the City would have dedicated coverage in a 1.5 square mile area. This would enable the officers to become more familiar with the City and its activities. More rapid police response would be possible. The Yamhill County Sheriff's Office would continue to provide services similar to current services during hours when a contract officer is not on duty.

The total amount of the levy is \$2.96 per \$1000 of assessed valuation each year for four years, beginning in tax year 2005-2006. This means that the estimated cost to maintain about 60 hours of law enforcement is around \$296.00 per year for a home with a value of \$100,000 (\$2.96/\$1,000). This levy amount will remain the same for four years. During that time the levy is estimated to raise \$208,102 in 2005-06; \$214,304 in 2006-07; \$231,472 in 2007-08; and \$238,567 in 2008-09. The estimated total raised for the four years is \$892,454.



EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure, if passed, would repeal Dundee Ordinance No. 417-2003 (passed September 23, 2003) that created a motor vehicle fuel tax for fuel sold inside the City. The tax rate is established at two cents (\$.02) per gallon and was instituted because Dundee has many inadequate and substandard City streets that need attention. The fuel tax is to be used exclusively for the construction, reconstruction, improvement, repair, maintenance, operation and use of the City streets.

Dundee, in conjunction with Yamhill County and the Oregon Department of Transportation conducted a study that resulted in the Dundee Transportation System Plan (TSP.) The plan identified an estimated \$17.8 million in capital projects necessary to meet Dundee's transportation needs in a 20 to 25 year window of which \$4.3 million is to be funded solely by the City. The annual cost for the City's \$4.3 million is approximately \$215,000.00.

The City has limited revenue sources and has depended on revenue from the State gas tax to fund Dundee's Street Department in prior years. The total amount received in 2002-2003 was \$110,000, approximately half of the funds necessary. The gas tax ordinance passed last September by the Council followed the suggestion in the TSP as a way to help fund the city's transportation needs and was considered the most viable immediate option to increase revenues. It is estimated to bring in \$54,000.00 per year, the greater share being paid by service station patrons, rather than Dundee residents.

The repeal of Ordinance No. 417-2003 would mean the loss of this estimated \$54,000.00 in revenue and remove a funding strategy for short and long term city street improvements.

**CITY OF DUNDEE, OREGON
ORDINANCE No. 417-2003**

AN ORDINANCE CREATING AND IMPOSING A TAX ON MOTOR VEHICLE FUEL DEALERS; PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT, ADMINISTRATION AND COLLECTION OF THE TAX.

WHEREAS, Dundee is an Oregon home-rule municipal corporation having the authority and power under the terms of its Charter to exercise all the powers and authority that the constitution, statutes and common law of the United States and this State expressly or impliedly grant or allow as though each such powers were specifically enumerated therein;

WHEREAS, said authority and power includes the authority to impose a tax on the sale of motor vehicle fuel sold within the City;

WHEREAS, the City Council wishes to exercise that power and to limit the use of any revenues generated by said tax to purposes associated with the administration, construction, repair, maintenance, operation and use of public roads;

NOW THEREFORE, based on the foregoing be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Dundee:

Section 1. The City Council hereby establishes a tax on motor vehicle fuel dealers to read as follows:

Section 1. Definitions.

As used in this Ordinance, unless the context requires otherwise:

- A. "City" means the City of Dundee, Oregon.
- B. "Dealer" means any person who:
1. Imports or causes to be imported motor vehicle fuel for sale, use or distribution in the City, but not including anyone who imports motor vehicle fuel into the City in quantities of 500 gallons or less purchased from a dealer licensed under this Chapter if said dealer assumes liability for payment of the license tax to the City; or
 2. Acquires for sale, use or distribution in the City, motor vehicle fuels with respect to which there has been no license tax previously incurred.
- C. "Distribution" means, in addition to its ordinary meaning, the delivery of motor vehicle fuel by a dealer to any service station or into any tank, storage facility or series of tanks or storage facilities connected by pipelines, from which motor vehicle fuel is withdrawn directly for sale or delivery into the fuel tanks of motor vehicles whether or not the service station, tank or storage facility is owned, operated or controlled by the dealer.
- D. "Street" means every way, thoroughfare and place of whatever nature, open for use of the public for the purpose of vehicular travel within the jurisdiction of and under the authority of the City.
- E. "Motor Vehicle" means all vehicles, engines or machines, movable or immovable, operated or propelled by the use of motor vehicle fuel.
- F. "Motor Vehicle Fuel" means and includes gasoline, diesel, and any other flammable or combustible gas or liquid, by

whatever name such gas or liquid is known or sold, usable as fuel for the operation of motor vehicles, except gas or liquid is for purposes other than the propulsion of motor vehicles.

G. "Person" includes every natural person, association, firm, partnership, or corporation.

H. "Service Station" means and includes any place operated for the purpose of retaining and delivering motor vehicle fuel into the fuel tanks of motor vehicles.

Section 2. Tax Imposed.

A business license tax is hereby imposed on every dealer. This business license tax is in addition to the business license fee required pursuant to Dundee Ordinance No. 362.

Section 3. Amount and Payment.

A. Subject to subsection (B) below, every dealer in the City who engages in the sale, use or distribution of motor vehicle fuel whether in the dealer's name, the name of another or the name of the dealer's representative/agent is required to do the following:

1. Provide a statement (not later than the 25th of each month) to the City of all motor vehicle fuel sold, used or distributed by the dealer in the City as well as all such fuel sold, used or distributed in the City by a purchaser for which sale, use or distribution the dealer has assumed liability for the applicable license tax during the preceding month.

2. Pay a license tax computed on the basis of \$.02 per gallon of such motor vehicle fuel so sold, used or distributed as shown by such statement in the manner and within the time provided in this Ordinance. The Council may revise the amount of the tax imposed by the terms of this Ordinance by resolution at any such time the Council deems that appropriate.

B. In lieu of claiming a refund of the tax as provided in Section 18 of this Ordinance or of any prior erroneous payment of the license tax made to the City by the dealer, the dealer may show such motor vehicle fuel tax as a credit or deduction of the monthly statement and payment of tax.

Section 4. License Requirements.

No dealer shall sell, use or distribute any motor vehicle fuel until the dealer has secured a dealer's license as required herein.

Section 5. License Applications and Issuance.

A. Every person before becoming or remaining a dealer in motor vehicle fuel in the City shall obtain a license authorizing said person to engage in business as a dealer.

B. Applications for the license shall be made on forms prescribed, prepared and furnished by the City, including (but not limited to) information on the following:

1. The business name under which the applicant transacts business.

2. The address of applicant's principal place of business and location of distributing stations in the City.

3. The name and address of the managing agent, the names and addresses of the persons constituting the firm or partnership or, if a corporation, the name under which the corporation is authorized to transact business and the names and addresses of its principal officers and registered agent.

C. Once the application is complete and accepted for filing, the City shall issue the dealer a license to transact business in the City. A license is not assignable and is valid only for the dealer in whose name it is issued.

D. The City shall retain all completed applications together with a record of all licensed dealers for a minimum of five (5) years.

Section 6. Failure to Secure License.

A. If a dealer fails to secure a license prior to becoming or remaining a dealer in the City, the tax on all motor vehicle fuel sold, distributed or used by that dealer shall be immediately due and payable.

B. The City shall proceed to determine from as many reliable and available sources as the City deems reasonable the amount of tax due, and shall assess the dealer for the amount found due, together with a penalty of 25% of the tax. In any suit or proceeding to collect the tax or penalty or both, the assessment shall be prima facie evidence that the dealer is indebted to the City in the amount of the tax and penalty stated.

Section 7. Cancellation of License.

A. The City may, upon written request of a dealer, cancel a license issued to that dealer. The City shall, upon approving the dealer's request for cancellation, set a date not later than 30 days after receipt of the written request, after which the license shall no longer be effective.

B. The City may, after 30 days' notice has been mailed to the last known address of the dealer, cancel the license of the dealer upon finding that the dealer is no longer engaged in the business of a dealer.

Section 8. Payment of Tax and Delinquency Penalties.

A. The license tax imposed by this Chapter shall be paid on or before the 25th day of each month.

B. Except as provided in subsections (C) and (D) of this section, if payment of the tax is not paid as required by subsection (A), a penalty of one percent (1%) of such license tax may be assessed by the City and shall be immediately due and payable.

C. Except as provided in subsection (D), if payment of the tax and penalty (if any) is not made on or before the 1st day of the next month following that month in which payment is due, the City may impose a further penalty of up to ten percent (10%) of the tax. Said penalty shall be in addition to the penalty provided for in subsection (B) above and shall be immediately due and payable.

D. Penalties imposed by this Section shall not apply if a penalty has been assessed pursuant to Section 6.

E. The City may waive any penalties assessed under this section.

Section 9. Failure to File Monthly Statement.

If a dealer fails to file the statement required by Section 3 above, the City shall proceed to determine from as many available sources as the City determines reasonable the amount of motor vehicle fuel sold, distributed or used by such dealer for the period unreported, and such determination shall in any proceeding be prima facie evidence of the amount of fuel sold, distributed or used. The City shall immediately assess the dealer for the license tax upon the amount determined, adding thereto a penalty of 10 percent (10%) of the tax.

Section 10. Exemption of Export Fuel.

A. The license tax imposed by Section 2 of this Ordinance shall not be imposed on motor vehicle fuel:

1. Exported from the City by a dealer; or

2. Sold by a dealer in individual quantities of 500 gallons or less for export by the purchaser to an area or areas outside the City in containers other than the fuel tank of a motor vehicle, but every dealer shall be required to report such exports and sales to the City.

B. Any motor vehicle fuel carried from the City in the fuel tank of a motor vehicle shall not be considered as exported from the City.

C. In support of any exemption from taxes on account of sales of motor vehicle fuel in individual quantities of 500 gallons or less for export by the purchaser, the dealer shall retain in the dealer's files for at least two years an export certificate executed by the purchaser in such form and containing such information as is prescribed by the City. This certificate shall be prima facie evidence of the exportation of the motor vehicle fuel to which it applies only if accepted by the dealer in good faith.

Section 11. Sales to Armed Forces Exempted.

The license tax imposed by Sections 2 and 3 shall not be imposed on any motor vehicle fuel sold to the Armed Forces of the United States but every dealer shall be required to report such sales to the City. A certificate by an authorized officer of such Armed Forces shall be accepted by the dealer as sufficient proof that the sale is for the purpose specified in the certificate.

Section 12. Fuel in Vehicles Coming Into City Not Taxed.

Any person coming into the City in a motor vehicle may transport in the fuel tank of such vehicle, motor vehicle fuel for the person's own use only and for the purpose of operating such motor vehicle without securing a license or paying the tax provided in this Chapter.

Section 13. Fuel Sold or Delivered to Dealers.

A. A dealer selling or delivering motor vehicle fuel to dealers is not required to pay a license tax thereon unless the selling dealer has assumed liability for the payment of the applicable license tax to the City.

B. The dealer in rendering monthly statements to the City as required by Section 3 shall show separately the number of gallons of motor vehicle fuel sold.

Section 14. Examinations and Investigations.

The City, or its authorized agents may make an examination of accounts, records, stocks, facilities and equipment of dealers, service stations and other persons engaged in storing, selling or distributing motor vehicle fuel within this City and such other investigations as it considers necessary in carrying out the provisions of this Ordinance. If the examination discloses that reports of dealers or other persons have shown incorrectly the amount of motor vehicle fuel distributed or the tax accruing thereon, the City may make changes in subsequent reports and payments of such dealers or other persons or may make such refunds as may be necessary to correct the errors disclosed.

Section 15. Limitation on Credit for or Refund of Overpayment and on Assessment of Additional Tax.

A. Except as otherwise provided in this Ordinance, any credit for erroneous overpayment of tax made by a dealer taken on a subsequent return or any claim for refund of tax erroneously overpaid filed by a dealer must be so taken or filed within three years after the date on which the overpayment was made to the City.

B. Except in the case of a fraudulent report or neglect to make a report, every notice of additional tax proposed to be assessed under this Ordinance shall be served on dealers within three years from the date upon which such additional taxes become due, and shall be subject to penalty as provided in Section 10.

Section 16. Examining Books and Accounts of Carrier of Motor Vehicle Fuel.

The City or duly authorized agents of the City may at any time during normal business hours examine the books and accounts of any carrier or motor vehicle fuel operating with the City for the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this Chapter.

Section 17. Records to be Kept by Dealers.

Every dealer in motor vehicle fuel shall keep a record in such form as may be prescribed by the City of all purchases, invoices, bills of lading, receipts, sales and distribution of motor vehicle fuel for a period of not less than three (3) years. The records shall include copies of all invoices or bills of all such sales and shall at all times during the business hours of the day be subject to inspection by the City or authorized officers or agents of the City.

Section 18. Use of Tax Revenues.

A. The City Administrator and his or her designated representative shall be responsible for the disposition of the revenue from the tax and penalties imposed by this Chapter in the manner provided by this section.

B. For the purpose of this section, net revenue shall mean the revenue from the tax and penalties imposed by this Chapter remaining after providing for the cost of administration and any refunds and credits authorized herein.

C. The net revenue shall be used for the planning, design, construction, maintenance, repair, operation and use of City streets within the City.

Section 2. The terms of this Ordinance shall be effective 30 days from its adoption and tax and reporting obligations imposed hereby shall take effect on the first day of the first full month following the said effective date.

Section 3. If any portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance.

Save Dundee's Streets- vote NO on the repeal of the Gas Tax

Have you driven along Upland Road, Southeast Locust Street, or any other Dundee street in need of repair and thought "Why hasn't the City done something about this"?

The answer came in September 2003 when the City Council approved a two cents per gallon Gas Tax Ordinance. This ordinance aims to generate funds dedicated to the maintenance, improvement, and repair of our streets. It also decreases the burden of these costs by including gas station patrons to the tax base. The thousands of motorists who do not live in Dundee, but merely drive through, will pay this tax. For example, a motorist who buys 15 gallons of gas per week would pay only about \$16 per year.

The two cents per gallon is estimated to provide \$54,000, roughly a quarter of the Street Fund annual budget. Without this revenue, budget cuts may be necessary - potholes would go unfilled, street sweeping would decrease, and sidewalk maintenance and repair would go undone, compromising the safety of pedestrians and motorists. As anyone can see, without the necessary funds the Gas Tax provides, the city would be forced to alternative funding sources.

This ballot measure, proposed by the proprietor of Dundee's only gas station, asks voters if Ordinance 417-2003, the Gas Tax, should be repealed. The consequences of a repeal are clear: the loss of a valuable source of revenue and the further deterioration of our streets. "Band-aid" solutions are irresponsible fiscal policy, but could be the option of last resort if the gas tax is repealed. Your City Council has made every effort to make responsible fiscal decisions, now it is up to you, the voters. I strongly urge you and your neighbors to vote **AGAINST** a repeal of this important ordinance.

Since 1990, the population of the City of Lafayette has grown from 1,292 to 3,010 – an increase of nearly 133 percent. Most of that growth has been in the last 10 years. Almost all of the undeveloped land in the City has been approved for development and growth is expected to continue for the foreseeable future. Five subdivisions are currently under construction at the north end of the City. Lafayette is experiencing pressures from this population growth, including increased traffic, domestic disturbances, vandalism, graffiti, and burglaries. Conflicts between neighbors and nuisance complaints are becoming more common.

Last year, the City of Lafayette contracted with the Yamhill County Sheriff for 20 hours of police services per week. These services were funded by the City's general fund, which is also the sole source of funds for the fire department, and emergency dispatching services through the Yamhill County Communications Agency. Parks and recreation, planning, building, and the municipal court are funded through the general fund, supplemented by user fees. State-required audits, legal services and general administration costs account for the remainder of the general fund. Property tax revenue is the major source of revenue for the general fund, and currently amounts to approximately \$257,000 per year.

If the local option levy is approved by voters, the City would use these revenues to supplement general fund revenues in order to increase the number of hours of police services provided by the Yamhill County Sheriff's Office from twenty (20) hours to sixty (60) hours per week. Existing general fund revenues would still be needed to provide this increased level of service. The City intends to use the increased availability of police coverage to assist city staff in enforcing city ordinances.

The amount of the requested levy is \$1.00 per \$1,000 assessed value for a period of five (5) years. For a home with an assessed value of \$100,000, this would increase taxes by \$100.00 per year. It is estimated that the levy would raise \$87,500 for fiscal year 2005-06, the first year of the levy.



**A MEASURE PROPOSING ANNEXATION OF THE
RUDEN PROPERTY**

On June 17, 2004, the McMinnville Planning Commission held a hearing to consider a request from Alan Ruden Inc., to annex a parcel of land approximately 19.32 acres in size to the City of McMinnville. The property is generally located north of Wallace Road and east of meadows Drive, and is further described as a portion of Tax Lot 302, Section 18, T. 4 S., R. 4 W., W.M. This property is within the McMinnville Urban Growth Boundary, and borders the existing city limit line on the east and west. At the conclusion of this hearing, the Planning commission forwarded to the City Council a recommendation that the Ruden property be annexed to the City of McMinnville, and be withdrawn from the McMinnville Rural Fire Protection District, subject to voter approval.

The McMinnville Comprehensive Plan, adopted in 1981, designates this property for residential use. If annexed, the owner proposes to plat approximately 44 single-family lots ranging in size from 7,000 to 9,000 square feet within the site. An approximately 2.5-acre open space is proposed within the site's midsection.

The City Council, upon review of the Planning Commission hearing record on July 13, 2004, adopted Ordinance No. 4811 finding that the request for annexation of the Ruden property met the land use and annexation ordinance criteria of the City of McMinnville. This ordinance also directed City staff to prepare the ballot title and explanatory statement to be submitted to the Yamhill County Clerk for the November 2, 2004, election.

Ruden Annexation**



**MEASURE PROPOSING ANNEXATION OF 2.41
ACRES (TWO PARCELS) INTO NEWBERG**

QUESTION: Should Newberg annex approximately 2.41 acres located at 813 South Springbrook?

SUMMARY: This measure would annex two parcels to the City of Newberg. The parcels are south of current City limits. The parcels are proposed to be zoned M-2 (Light Industrial). If these parcels are annexed into the City, the parcels would be withdrawn from the Newberg Rural Fire Protection District.

The parcels are currently vacant. The conceptual development plan shows two buildings (19,000 and 22,000 square feet) for industrial use with access off of S. Springbrook Road. The parcels would be consolidated into a single parcel, and would be connected to City water and sanitary sewer services. The applicant would construct a half-street improvement along the S. Springbrook Road frontage.

The owner of the two parcels has requested that the City of Newberg annex the properties.

The Newberg City Council determined that the application met land use approval criteria. The City Charter requires annexations to be approved by the electorate of the City.

EFFECT OF PASSAGE: If this measure passes, two parcels, which consist of 2.41 acres, would be incorporated into the City limits of the City of Newberg. The parcels would be withdrawn from the Newberg Rural Fire Protection District.

BACKGROUND: This measure would annex two parcels to the City of Newberg. Both of the parcels are south of the current Newberg City limits, and are bounded by the City limits on the west, north and east sides. The parcels are currently vacant. The conceptual development plan shows two buildings (19,000 and 22,000 square feet) for industrial use with access off of S. Springbrook Road. As a condition of annexation, the parcels would be consolidated into a single parcel, and would be connected to City water and sanitary sewer services. The applicant would construct a half-street improvement along the S. Springbrook Road frontage.

The owner of the parcels is R.P. Grahn, Inc. The owner requested that the City of Newberg annex the properties.

All of the properties are within the Newberg Urban Growth Boundary. The properties are proposed to be zoned as M-2 (Light Industrial).

The Newberg City Council determined that the application has met the land use criteria for approval and that development of the parcels will allow and provide adequate resources for the extension of public infrastructure and City services to the annexation area.


