**Topic: Neighborhood Meeting Concerning Speed Limit on Grand Island Road**

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Chair Lewis opened the meeting at 7:03 p.m. and introduced the Board of Commissioners; Bill Gille, Public Works director; and Lt. Ken Summers of the Sheriff's Office.

Commissioner Lewis explained to the citizens that the county had discovered that Chapter 811 of the Oregon statutes does not allow a residence district on a collector road. Since Grand Island is a collector road in the county's system, the 25 mph speed limit will be taken off of Grand Island Road on May 10, 2006.

Commissioner Lewis also explained to the citizens that a speed study could be done and a different speed zone lower than basic rule could be determined. She said that the commissioners would like to hear from the citizens in attendance what speed limit they believe would be appropriate for Grand Island Road. A number of citizens spoke, with a general consensus that a speed limit in the 35-45 mph range would be acceptable. Commissioner George asked the citizens for a show of hands for how many would accept a speed limit in that range and nearly every hand was raised.

Mr. Gille explained that it would take about three days of staff time to compile the data to send to the ODOT Speed Control Board to seek approval for a lower speed limit.

The commissioners concluded the meeting by stating that Public Works staff would do the study and submit the data to the Speed Control Board to seek a lower speed limit.

Meeting was adjourned at 8:18 p.m.
